Bro. P. Christie presented report on education. Moved seconded and resolved, that this report be adopted.
Committee on municipal law, presented their report.
Moved by Bro. Christie, sec. by Bro. Bond, that this report be received and adopted.—Carried.
Moved by Bro. H. Reid, sec. by Bro. G. Richardson, that a Committee consisting of Bros. Gifford, Christie, the master and the mover be appointed to consider the propriety of petitioning the local parliament for a change in the constitution of County Councils, also to suggest what change ought to be recommended.—Carried.
Moved by Bro. A. Bond, sec. by Bro. J. Long, that the report of Committee on Municipal law be forwarded to the ex-committee of Provincial Grange with a request that they consider the subject and take active steps to secure the desired amendments.—Carried.
Report on good of order presented by Bro. Tupper.
Moved by Bro. Tupper, sec. by Bro. Armstrong, that the report of Committee on good of order be received and adopted.—Carried.
Moved by Bro. A. Gifford, sec. by Bro. H. Reid, that a committee be named by the worthy master to inquire into the proposed "Tonens" system of land transfer, and report thereon at the next meeting of this Division Grange.—Carried.
The W. M. named Bros. Gifford, Reid and Christie as the Committee.
The W. M. appointed Bros. Gifford, Tupper and Richardson, as a committee on Bailey Grading as per report of Committee.
Report of Committee on Horticulture.
Presented and read by Bro. Doyle, moved seconded and resolved that the report be received adopted and entered on the minutes.
Moved by Bro. J. M. Tupper, seconded by Bro. A. Gifford, that this Grange discuss the question of the possibility and utility of establishing local co-operative stores in every market town.—Carried.
Moved by Bro. D. Armstrong, seconded by Bro. H. Reid, that the caretaker of this hall be paid \$1 for the use of the hall.—Carried.
Bros. Reid and Gifford addressed the Grange on the business transacted at last meeting of Provincial Grange stating that the business of that body was transacted in a very satisfactory and business-like manner. The W. M. gave some explanations on the working of the Grange Insurance Company.
Moved by Bro. A. Gifford, seconded by Bro. H. Reid, that the delegates here present exert their influence in their sub-granges and neighborhood to secure as large an attendance as possible on Wednesday of the exhibition week of the Agricultural and Arts Association, at Guelph, that being the day specially set apart for the Grange.—Carried.

Ballot passed and was favorable.
Moved by Bro. Best, seconded by Bro. Elliott, that the next meeting of this Division Grange be held at Markdale.—Carried.

The Officers and Members of this Division Grange, Assailed:
Your committee on Horticulture take pleasure in reporting that there are of course many crops of fruit the present year while the apple crop may in some cases be slightly under the average yet many of our small fruit trees are believed, will be an average crop. Your committee desire to draw the attention of the Grange to the fact that the apple which has been so disastrous to the plum growers in other sections of the province. This insect, together with the black knot, in many sections of the province, completely destroyed both tree and fruit. The county of Grey, being the largest growing county in Ontario, having a far and wide reputation for the quality of its fruit. Patrons should use every effort to retain its reputation in this respect. Your committee are of opinion that the members of the Grange may be of very great service to themselves and the community by pointing out the danger to the province, and by using their influence to ward off this threatened evil. The committee made its appeal in a variety of localities last year, and those persons who have acted promptly have succeeded in keeping it well in bounds.
