MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY.

We dropped casually into Armstrong Bros. Cheese Box and Fruit crate factory one day recently and were agreeably surprised with the proportions to which this infant industry had developed. Every necessary equipment is here found for the manufacture of cheese boxes, cheese box material and fruit crates. The material for this class of work is of a superior quality in this district, and all the machinery in use the most modern and approved being second to none in Ontario, while the proprietors are both practical and enterprising so that the quantity of stock turned out justly merits the entire satisfaction of all customers. The proprietors deliver all orders within a radius of forty miles from Markdale to boxes ready made, while they ship large quantities of Box material to Belleville, Kingston and other points. In the fruit crate line this is the first season for our Markdale factory but judging from the universal satisfaction given, in the quality as well as price of these goods the demand will be uniform another year. They also do an extensive business in the saw mill department making a specialty of hard wood, which they ship to various points. We are pleased to note those undoubted evidences of progress in connection with this industry for more than one reason—in the first place, an industry is our midst which gives employment to a dozen or more hands with every prospect of increasing the number very materially, converting the products of the forest into useful and merchantable goods, and distributing capital and wages in our midst, and also to know that industry and perseverance together with honorable dealing on the part of the proprietors is meeting with merited success.

About the Size of It.

The following from the Chatsworth correspondence in the Owen Sound Advertiser is to the point and generally applicable as well as in Chatsworth. They call them "Agricultural" Societies. Out of 112 members to date belonging to the Holland "Agricultural" Society, exactly 52 members, or nearly one-half, are residents either of our own town or some other, and are no more agriculturists than they are mariners. Probably not half a dozen out of this 50 will ever show a cent's worth at the show. It is almost impossible to get an agriculturist to join this "Agricultural" Show unless he expects to get his dollar back. The inevitable answer is "Oh, I have nothing to show." In other words, "I have no way of getting my dollar back." Now your correspondent believes in everybody joining the shows, town people as well as agriculturists. What he complains about is that the agriculturists do not give them as liberal a support, man for man, as the people do. Perhaps our farmer friends have no idea how much their town friends are imposed upon by the sellers of show tickets. Our own village here has three or four Agricultural Societies around it. And there are men in our village who are begged and begged for till they have to buy a ticket for every one of them. Every town or village has the same experience. Your correspondent is aware of how dependent the towns are on the country. But there is dependence on both sides, and in a matter that is mainly in the interest of the agriculturists your correspondent submits that they should give a more general and more liberal support. Perhaps \$9 out of every \$10 of prize money paid out at these shows goes to the agriculturists. Nine business men out of every 10 in our village are members of the Holland Show while not one farmer out of every 20 in the township is a member. Town people pay their dollar to the show to help it along; farmers as a rule pay their dollar because they expect to win five or six back. It isn't a fair deal, gentlemen. We don't grudge our money; we give it cheerfully. But in this matter, which almost entirely affects yourselves, you should meet us a good deal more than half way.
