### NOMINATIONS.

There was a good attendance at Markdale nomination on Monday evening. Owing to the illness of the Village Clerk, C. W. Rutledge acted as his deputy. The following nominations were made, viz:

J. Halbert. At the close of the nominations the Clerk vacated the chair and P. McCullough, Esq., was elected chairman, after which over two hours were occupied in voting. Mr. McFarland reviewed the past two and a half years, since the incorporation of the village, and showed that by wise municipal government the taxes had been getting lower each year and were now about twenty-five per cent. lower than they were before incorporation. Mr. Lyons made a few remarks and resigned, while Dr. Sprule criticised the doings of the late council, and especially those who had charge of road making, and also resigned, leaving Mr. McFarland elected by acclamation.

Several of the candidates for Councillors addressed the electors present, and Mr. Brown gave a sketch of the road making since incorporation which he claimed as creditable on the whole and wound up by a vigorous appeal in favor of the "By-laws" which it is to be voted on next Monday. Messrs. McFarland, Armstrong, Bonson, Currie and Halbert have withdrawn their names from the contest.

METHODIST CHURCH ANNIVERSARY.

The anniversary services in connection with the Methodist Church of this place were a decided success. Services were preached on Sunday the 21st ult. by Rev. J. W. Holmes, chairman of the Dist. Council, which were practical, powerful and much appreciated.

The Christmas entertainment was largely attended, as is usually the case. The great aim on this occasion was to secure \$2,000. of a new subscription to be applied in reducing the debt on the church, which is \$5,200. There was a grand array of speakers present and the choir was "loaded to the hilt" but the financial project interfered seriously with the ostensible aim of action so that the audience was doubtless cheated out of some excellent addresses as well as choice music. The culinary department was abundantly supplied with wholesome edibles and gave general satisfaction. After the inner man was supplied the program was entered upon with W. J. McFarland, Ed., in the chair. After opening preliminary Rev. Dr. Stone was called on and he endeavored the financial project in a vigorous, affable and masterly manner resulting in a bonafide subscription list of over \$2,000. Quite a number of the church officers and other loyal supporters being absent Mr. H. D. Irwin and the Treasurer are pushing the canvas until all are reached, when it is expected the amount will be swelled to upwards of \$2,500. When this part of the program was ended the evening was far advanced so that a number of the speakers as well as some of the best selections of music had to be dispensed with. Rev.
