SIR JOHN MACDONALD.

Saturday's daily papers scattered broadcast the sad intelligence of the serious illness of the Premier of the Dominion, he having been stricken down with paralysis at his residence in Ottawa at 4:15 on Friday evening. From that time his physicians held out no hope for his recovery, and the shock comes to all Canadians with singular sadness and effect.

He has not for years been in good health, but he seemed to have very much the same skill in getting over and fighting off physical ailments that he had in escaping political blows and calamities.

He has during the whole lifetime of the present generation been so much part of the order of things political in Canada, that it is hard for friend or foe to conceive of a Canadian political world in which he is not a prominent and chief figure. He possessed a wonderful magnetic influence together with remarkable power in uniting men and successfully welding antagonistic influences. He was the best known public man in the Dominion, and Canada at large, as well as the Conservative party, loses in the death of Sir John a statesman of unquestioned ability and power.

THE PREMIER'S PREVIOUS ATTACKS.—In 1870 Sir John was prostrated for four weeks and for some time was at the point of death, during which time he lay in his office in the east block too ill to be removed and nursed throughout without the services of Lady Macdonald. He was struck down on Wednesday, May 6, and on the 11th suffered a relapse. On Sunday, May 20, when apparently improving satisfactorily, he was seized with a wealth and was again prostrated on Wednesday, June 2, just 21 years ago, favorable symptoms set in and he began to rally. By July 1 he was able to leave for the seaside from which time rapidly convalesced. The Premier was again seriously ill in 1889, from a derangement of the stomach. He went to England and after several months of rest returned in good health.
