Snow fell to the depth of ten inches in South Dakota on Saturday last. It is said the lumber manufacturers of the United States have combined with a capital of \$8,000,000.

The strike of the Toronto brickmasons terminated on Thursday last after lasting nearly two months.

The Sir John Macdonald Montreal committee has raised over \$20,000 to erect a monument to the deceased premier, and will in a few days ask permission from the city council to erect the monument in the Dominion Square.

Messrs. D. W. Kinn and R. W. Knight, of Woodstock, obtained judgement for \$6,000 and \$4,000 respectively at God's Hall last Sunday in their legal contest with the Grand Trunk over the famous St. George bridge accident.
