Paying Points of Cows. Professor Robertson, the well-known anadian dairy authority, specifies five oints for judging a cow that will prove points for jugging a cow that will prove profitable, and properly holds that uncomfortable conditions of keeping, as to stable or defective feed, will neutralize even the best equipment. The points are as follows:

"A long udder lengthwise of her body; shill it should be very elastic in quality; the elastic quality means room to make milk. A soft skin—a mellow skin covered with massay, silky hair; a cow her spuly one claim.

A soft skin—a mellow skin covered with mossy, silky hair; a cow has only one skin around her body and clear through by way of her stomach. The skin, if coarse or harsh, means sluggish digestion uside and that means an expensive cow that does not digest her food or thrive well. Then, a cow should have a large roomy barrel with broad ribs wide apart, for holding plenty of good, rough, bulky, cheap feed; it should be filled up twice a day. See that the milk-veins under the cow's belly are prominent; prominence is a far more important indication than actualisize would be. Firmmuscles in the abdomen mean good constitution; they are one of the hest evidences of endurance and thrift that you can find in a cow.; and endurance to stand the strain of giving milk continuously is what you want. A cow should have broad loins with long rump. A rather long, lean neck, with clean cut face and prominent eyes. Those points indicate enduring power to stand the strain of a long milking season. If a cow has these five points she will usually have the power of serving a man well."
