There is to be no horse car in Toronto after Sept. 1 next.

Fair at Central Park, Toronto, Saturday, at about \$50000 to buildings.

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Passed Engaged legislature, at a stormy meeting, Tuesday, rejected a bill amending municipal suffrage, 50 to 25.

A bill to prohibit sale of liquor on election days of \$11,000 to the Liquor Control Board, proposed yesterday by a majority of 111.

The Ontario Legislative Assembly has passed a bill which will suffer aage in the legislature. It is conceded that it will pass the Senate, and also receive royal assent.

An excellent bill has been made in New York to incorporate a company with a large plant of manufacture and distribution which is to be a great success and paper goods.

The bill to regulate manufacture by a vote of 36 to 29, Dominion Prohibition Act, is now before a committee for a law to regulate tobacco, manufacture, and marketing liquors in Canada.

Bill to regulate liquor sales at Fort William introduced. They have 300000 bushels of grain, and will be able to market a larger quantity.
