Grand Orange Lodge.

The following report from the com mittee on correspondence at the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, held last week at Sault Ste. Marie, bearing on the Manitoba school question was adopted: The clause in the address of the Grand Master relating to Manitoba schools meets with the earnest approval of your committee. It is generally conceded that the State should educate the youth of the land: (1) Intellectually, in reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, history, etc., that each may be placed in as advantageous a position as possible to earn an honest living and become a good citizen. (2) Physically, that there may be sound bodies for sound, minds, (3) Politically, not in the narrow sense but in the broad understanding of the educational, municipal, provincial, and national forms of government through which the country is ruled (4) Ethicaly or morally, that each may readilly comprehend right from wrong, and be taught man's duty to fellow-man. 
