McMillan-Pedlar—That the comm. of Ward No. 2 be paid one dollar for examining bridge on Beaver river, as per resolution of council—carried.

Kells-McMillan—That commissioner Pedlar be paid two dollars services on committee on two bridges on gravel road and Eugenia—carried.

Pedlar-Kells—That the comm. of ward be appointed to examine bridge on 4th and 5th con., and report at next session, said bridge having been reported as dangerous for travel—carried.
