DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OUR LAWMAKERS IN COUNCIL

Proceedings of the Senate and House of Commons. New Bills Introduced and The Budget Contained.

Sir John Thompson and Hon. Mr. Gavigan introduced Mr. T. Blanchard, the new member for Gloucester, N.B. Sir Charles (Bothwell) moved for copies of all correspondence between the Government of Canada and the Imperial Government in Reference to Her Majesty's exclusive sovereignty over Hudson's Bay. He dwelt upon the importance of this question. While it was true that by the Treaty of Utrecht the sovereignty of Hudson's Bay had been secured to Great Britain, foreign fishermen were day to day robbing the waters in hunting for pelicans, porpoises, and it was important that steps should be taken to assert Canadian jurisdiction. He said the rule of acquiescence this right might have to be if it were to be remembered that the same as in private relations this rule of acquiescence was held to apply.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper fully acquitted himself, which had been said about the importance of the question, and he could assure the hon. gentleman in reference to the production of the papers asked for that they would show that the question had been referred to the hands of the government. As to invasion of our territory, right or wrong, any hunting by foreign vessels, inferior to ours, in time to him reached the Government of such occurrences, but the remoteness of the distance rendered it difficult to ascertain the exact facts.

Mrs. Mills (Bothwell) moved that it be proposed that steps should be taken by the Canadian Government to interfere with Hudson's Bay and other waterways upon the eastern coast of Canada.

Sir Charles H. Tupper said that he supported the motion had simply been moved in order that an expression of opinion might be had.

Hon. Mr. Ellis thought that the government should make the experiment.

Sir Charles H. Tupper said that the agriculturists had not been consulted by the Canadian Government, but had no objection if it could be shown that the Canadian Government had been consulted in the framing of the treaty.

Sir John Thompson said that the question was to be decided by the Canadian Government.
