EWE PRIZES.—Complaints are pretty general that the plum drop this fall will be a failure. The trees had an abundance of bloom and the young fruit formed nicely, but afterwards appeared to rot in the stem. Each winter storm has helped to strip the trees until there is but little of the crop remaining.

A Terrible Combat.

During several weeks past the grain crops of Mr. James Oliver, four miles east of Trillick, have been infested by chaffinches. Last Friday night he, in company with his cousin, Mr. James Vaux, cleaned themselves in a position close proximity to the point from which the birds usually made entrance; and in short time "entered an appearance as our legal gentlemen would say. Mr. Oliver "drew a bead" and nearly severed Vaux's windpipe, the beating making rapid retreat. The boys followed, and owing to the scrub brush, were about giving up the search when suddenly a brushy thicket in a wrathful glory and commenced chaffinching around the boys. Each was prepared with a revolver, and as often as a bird presented a clear mark from among the bushes, gave him a shot. This could not last forever, so Mr. Oliver concluded to put in the finishing stroke with his rifle, advanced and at the moment he was about to "let fly" with two feet of brain's head, the ungainly brute struck up the rifle barrel which discharged, and with an irresistible force sent Mr. O. sprawling by his head on the ground. With much yellow presence of mind, Mr. O. turned his arm down to the right, his other hand being badly bitten in the first instance. Meanwhile Mr. Vaux was not idle, for his rifle and revolver ammunition was exhausted, he continued to belabor the brute over the head. Immediately he turned upon Mr. V. who knelted down once, and got knocked down "twice" as a pleasant reminder that two can play at the same game. Mr. Oliver came to the front, butly worked, and in this time got fully saturated on the body. With a Waterloo work with his rifle, the brain concluded he had got more than his match, moved farther into the brush, the boys came to the safe conclusion that it was pudence to let well enough alone, and, unharmed in flesh, the clothing torn to shreds, they reached home in a pitiable plight.
