Week's Commercial Summary.

Nearly 7,000 shares of Montreal Street Railway sold in Montreal last week. The number of failures in the Dominion last week was 41, more than the same week in 1888.

The earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week of December 29 were \$16,000, a decrease of \$10,000.

The withdrawals from the Bank of Savings in Canada exceeded the deposits during the month of November by over \$50,000.

In the Dominion last week the failures numbered 41, as against 30 the previous week, and 37 the same week in the year before.

The receipts smaller than the expenditure of stock continues, and the visible supply both here and abroad is much larger.
