Fight Against Children's Diseases.

Whereas in European cities the battle of the municipal and health authorities, so far as epidemics are concerned, until a few years ago waged chiefly against small-pox, typhus, and occasional cholera, it is now considered that the chief fight has been waged by the world against those holding the enemies of the race, and the conduct he set in against the diseases which are hostile to child life. Scarlet fever and diphtheria, the chief of these children's maladies, with measles, less dreaded but extremely mischievous, have been the chief weapons have been mainly those vigilant, never-ceasing inspection, immunization, disinfection through the aid of highly refined and carefully sterilized, and in general the art of keeping up these avenues through which infection is most likely to be communicated. The difficulty of perfect isolation of the sick has led to the great extension of public hospitals for the reception of children in all diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles.

The great projects of the administrators of the public health systems are (1) to abolish the public institutions which are the sources of infection, and (2) to have an appeal to prevent its spread, which, of course, is the sound policy to be pursued.

But, (3) and concurrently, every possible effort is made to save the lives of the poor children seized with infectious maladies.
