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Adopted by the National Liberal Convention, Ottawa, Oct. 17, 1894. The Convention of the Dominion Liberal Party, held at Ottawa, on the 17th inst., after a session of three days, has adopted the following resolutions...

That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of the obstacles to her country's progress by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which will promote domestic and foreign trade, and hasten the return of prosperity to our people...

The present condition of the Senate is inconsistent with the Federal principles in our system of government, and in other respects defective, as it makes the Senate independent of the people and uncontrolled by the public opinion of the country...

The constant and continued decline of the public revenue has caused the officials of the Finance Department at Ottawa, and is especially disturbing to the Minister of Finance, who is unable to see any rift in the black cloud of depression and hard times which envelops us...

That things are getting rather worse than better, as shown by the fact that in December alone the falling of the total trade was less than over \$2,000,000 as compared with the previous December. A most important thing to bear in mind is that the first half of the fiscal year 1895 shows a heavy decline compared with the trade of 1894, and is less than it was in 1875...

That the Convention deplores the gross corruption in the management and expenditure of public moneys which for years past has existed under the rule of the Conservative party, and the revelations of which by the different committees of inquiry have brought disgrace upon the fair name of Canada...

That the Convention regrets that by the action of Ministers and their supporters in Parliament, in one case in which serious charges were made against a Minister of the Crown, investigation was altogether refused, while in another case the charges preferred were altered and then referred to a commission appointed under the advice of the Ministry...

That in the opinion of this Convention the sales of public lands in the Dominion should be to actual settlers only, and not to speculation, upon reasonable terms, and that the Government should be reasonably compensated for the land so sold.

That the Convention is in favor of the sale of the Dominion Government lands to actual settlers only, and not to speculation, upon reasonable terms...
