This would make the yield 230,672,775 bushels winter wheat, but even then the total crop would fall below four hundred million bushels according to the Government bushels according to the Government

Howard Pitesel. EVIDENCE SECURED. NEW Being Held—A B

Mrs. Pitezel, mother of the murdered boy, was telegraphyl at Galva, Ills., and identified the trunk fand the boy's coat. Coroner Carter took charge of the bones, and held an inquest, at which the officers and others testified.
