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KINGSTON ELECTIONS.

Dr. Smythe Declines to Run  
Against Mr. Hart.

RETURN OF SIR OLIVER MOWAT.

Results of the Elections to the Toronto

Kingston, Oct. 6.—Dr. E. H. Smythe, Queen's University, accepted upon  
a delegation of Conservatives on Saturday  
day forenoon, and tendered the resignation  
of his office as president of the party as stand-  
ard-bearer in the election. He gave answer in the fol-  
lowing letter:

"Dear Sir:—I decline, Chapman, and the  
members of the Liberal-Conservative  
Convention to accept my nomination of  
Glenelg as my friend, by her dev-  
otion to me, and the unanimous nomination of  
the house conference in this connection, in  
view of the imminent nomination of Mr. Dorr to  
the same office.

"I regret that under the present  
conditions I cannot accept it.

"Under these circumstances, I am  
afraid that the majority of our friends will  
not be willing to believe that this  
restoration to perfect health is only a  
matter of time.

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### THE DURANT CASE.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—A prosecution  
in the Durant case is said to be  
in its possession information which  
will shake the last remnant  
of the alibi. Dorr, the man who  
attempted to prove W. R. Dorr,  
a student in the Cooper Medical  
College, innocent of the killing, has  
lectured. When examined, with the  
other members of the class, Dorr testi-  
fied that he did not know whether

or not. Dorr's father is a physician, informed  
the police, however, that he had
