Illuminating Opaque Objects for the. Microscope. The ill mination of opaque objects for the microscope has for high powers, been hitherth almost impossible. M. Ch. Fremont has described an extremely in-Fremont has described, an extremely ingenious method of carrying out the desired end. Inside the body of the mic oscope is fixed a concave mirror, which reflects the bundle of rays of light received through an abject tire in the side, and condered parallel by an interposed prism, through an object glass, on to the object under examination.
