The Council met in Price's Hall, Holland Centre, on Feb. 12.

All members were present.

Minutes of meeting held Jan. 30 were read and signed.

The following report presented and read: Auditors' report on receipts and expenditure for 1895; Auditors' report on Treasurer's receipts and report of Council's committee on the same; tenders for printing and supplies for 1896 from Chatsworth News \$80, Chatsworth Banner, 30c, Markdale Standard \$80; letter from E. B. Rogers, asking further aid: certificate of Dep. R. Geary's registration of births, marriages and deaths for 1895.

The different reports were adopted and ordered to be printed with the minutes.

No action was taken on the request of E. B. Rogers.

The contract for printing and supplies was awarded the Chatsworth News, being the lowest tender.

The time for the return of the Collector's roll was further extended till March 1st.

The clerk was instructed to notify Mrs. Wm. Greenaway and Robert Gillies to remove fences and other obstructions from the road opposite their lots.

The referee was appointed to ascertain if certain timber taken by Mr. Merriam was on road allowance, and if so to collect pay for same.

Messrs. Hamilton and Murray were instructed to examine certain road allowances in their respective wards, and report to the timber standing there.

By-law No. 4 of 1895, for appointing an Assessor, was presented, read and approved, and the necessary readings and was signed.
