price than it has been this winter and when the purchasing power of the people was very much me e limited, and means of transportation decidedly inferior: What would our farmers and others have done this season had it not been for the railway. It would have been a serious task to have moved hay and straw from one neighborhood to another, or from one township to ap other, with the roads in such a condi tion as they have been as a rule, but to supplies from province, or the eastern borders of this, would have been utterly out of the question without the aid of the iron horse. It's true that a large amount of money has been paid out for stock feed, but is this not a proof that our farmers have been progressive and in a large degree prosperous? When individual agriculturists can pareluse for eash one, two, three and in some cases four hundred dollars worth of fodder and still retain a sang deposit in the bank, as many have done, we have ample reason for faith in our country and confidence in our farmers.
