Co-Operative Agriculture. Comparative tests of over on and varieties of farm crops. Valuable reports of Ontario farmers, Experiments in Agriculture for 1896. Experimental Department at the § W. J. McFarland & Son. Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, is the testing of different varieties o tarm crops. Within the past ten years upwards of 1.000 kinds have been grown on plots similar in size and shape, an situated side by side. Fully 600 of this number been grown from four to seven years in succession. Not only

have all the available varieties in Ontario have been tested but similar tests have been made with varieties from twenty one foreign countries. A few imported varieties in nearly a!! asses of farm crop have given better esults than the best Ontario kinds in he average seven years' experiments. After the varieties have been very parefully tested at the College for about

ive years, the best are selected for test ing in a co-operative way throughout ntario. These co-operative experinents are carried on chiefly through the medium of the ex-students' Experimental Union: but any farmer in Ontario may join in the work, provided he applies for the seed early, and agrees to make a careful test and to report the results according to specified instructons. Within the past five years, we have distributed to experiments up wards of 32.000 packages of choice see with very gratifying results.

·For a detailed account of the various tests conducted in 1805, the reader is eferred to the report of the Experinental Union, which is published as an ppendix to the Agricultural College eport for the same year. This report s now being distributed by the Department of Agriculture, Toronto, to those who reported the results of their co-operative experiments in 1895, and to the members of the Farmers' Instit-

Our Agricultural College has imported into Ontario some foreign varieties of farm crops, which have made high records both at the College and throughout the province. Those which we will nention in this brief article are as ollows -Siberian Oats, Russia; Joanetta Oats, France; Poland White Oats, France | Mandscheuri Barley, Russia ; Herison Bearded spring Wheat, France; Mammoth Cuban Corn, U.S.; Wisconsin Earliest White Deut Corn, U. S.; Salzer's North Dakota Corn. U. S. Jersey Navet Turnip. U. S.; Salzer's Dakota Millet, U. S.; etc.

Among the leading varieties of farm rops, the seed of which we obtained n Ontario, the following have made high records :- Dawson's Golden Chaff Winter Wheat, Bavarian Oats, Red Fern Spring Wheat, Prussian Blue Peas, Canadian Beauty Peas, Egyptian Mummy Peas, Hartley's Bronze Top Swede Turnip, Improved Short White Carrot, Improved Mammoth Sawlog Mangel, Empire State Potato, etc. There are other varieties both foreign and Canadian which have given excel

lent results, some of which have not peen used in co-operative experiments EXPERIMENTS IN 1896.
