BY REV. MARK GUY PEARSE Romans xiii, 8-14.
The religion of Jesus Christ is this, and this only a life of love. Let us think what it may be, and plas! what it often is. An occasional service, mere round of hymn and prayer and sermon a thing altogether outside and away from us whilst the real self sleeps and the real life waits outside. Is there any least thing in the week that does not stir more interest of mind and heart than the Sunday service with many who tlink and call themselves Christians ? It is gone through-then we have done our duty, and go away leaving all behind, and in, the private de-

sire or expectation. Or our religion may be a mere intellectual agreement with certain truths. With how many people this passes for religion. To be orthodox in the creed: to be exact, rigid, precise in our belief; to be skilful in definitions, with words packed as cleverly as in an Oriental puzzle. But our orthodoxy will count for nothing if we do not love our brother. be taken in by the catalogues sent out, Orthodoxy without love is the religion by city firms. Perhaps in a moment of of the devil-and that is not much to boast of.

Or our religion may be a rapturous feeling, and yet be nothing. With many religion is not so much of the intellect as of the emotion. No words of ours can possibly put this danger so strongly as St. Paul does. 'Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not love, I am become as sounding brass, or a trinkling cymbal." To speak with tongues meant to have heavenly influences sweeping and surging about the soul like a very tide ; to be filled with feeling ; to be stirred into an ecstasy of utterance ; to have the soul played upon as by the fingers of God's angels. Yet without love all this was nothing. "If a make say, I love God, and hateth his brother he is a liar," says St. John bluntly. No service, no creed, no feeling, no utterance is worthy anything except as it leads up to a life of love.

LOVE'S NECESSITY. We are apt to think of love as one of the graces that we may grow in the garden of the Lord-a luxurious ornament for those who can afford it. but notessential if we believe in Jesus Christ. Nothing can be more terribly misleading than such a delusion ds that. The ife of God is slain within us by the lack of love. Love is the only atmosphere in which the life of God can exist. The want of love is the want of all. The lack of love destroys our yery reationship to God, and our position in Christ. Read that story in which Jesus Christ tells of the man who owed his lord ten thousand talents, and when his lord would have sold him and his wife and children, the man fell down and entreated his lord's pity. Moved with compassion he forgave him all. Then forth went the forgiven man and found a fellow-servant who owed

the throat and harshly demanded his debt. In vain the poor fellow pleaded. He is flung into prison, never to come forth until the uttermost farthing is paid. The whole place was filled with ndignation, and they hastened to tell the lord of what had happened. Ther came forth that indignant lord, an bade them take the man who did so foul a thing and hand him to the tormentors till he should pay all that he owed.
