

TORONTO SATURDAY NIGHT.

Last Saturday evening Dr. T. S. Sproule, M. P., for East Grey, returned to his constituency after having, all through the recent session of Parliament, systematically and most effectually opposed the passage of the Remedial Bill in the House of Commons. His personal views have been well known ever since the Manitoba school question was brought into Federal politics, but when the Government, the Conservative Government, resolved to force Manitoba down the hierarchy desired, it was spontaneously thought that Dr. Sproule would follow his personal convictions and ignore the sediments of his constituents. In East Grey it was thought that he would do this, because Dr. Sproule had been for years one of the most reliable fighting men in the Conservative party, and it was thought that all that was necessary was to hint to him that the passage of a Remedial Bill would be a good party measure, the bringing more voters in Quebec than in Manitoba, etc., etc.

But Dr. Sproule, M. P., proved unmanageable for the first time. He rebelled against the party discipline which he had always previously strengthened by protest on the grounds that the members of the Cabinet had no authority from the Conservative

He was sent to his constituents; he responded; he will be re-elected during the campaign that is almost here, he will be in demand all over Ontario.
