Who Next.

Progress is about the swiftest thing of the age. Oftentimes, however, progression is exceedingly slow, and difficult to put in motion, but when once well under way the spirit seems to spread over a neighborhood like the golden winged potatobug or the chittering thorney legged grasshopper. The spirit is now aroused, and to James Foster of the east back line, near Cheeseville, be all honor and praise for breathing the breath of life into it. There's a little hill just opposite his barn, that, like hundreds of its kind hereabouts, has for many years been very rough owing to the numerous stones thereon varying in size from that of a large pumpkin down to a small turnip. The neighbors, the taxpayers, the pathmaster and the township councilman have all been travelling over these boulders for years breaking horse shoes cruelly punishing their horses, fracturing wagon tires, straining wheels and axles, and, as each year rolls back into the vanished sunshine and deepning shades of the vista of the past the jolt-

ng must of necessity rack and twist and distort their own frames, and just in proportion as the dirt is washed way from the boulders and they protrude further and become more prominent each year, so too, the hump on our backs become bigger, and the sight in our eye becomes more dim. Every little elevation along this concession and every other concession and sideroad, and even the gravel road, is more or less covered with these stones the same as the hill referred to.
