Henry; vice-president, Miss McFarland; secretary, W. Turner; treasurer, C. W. Rutledge; librarian, A. Macpherson; ass't. librarian, Miss Muir; auditors, J. S. Rowe and Miss McFarland.

The board will hold monthly meetings on the evening of the first Saturday of each month, same as last year. The membership to commence the year is 103.
