The Epworth League Convention held last Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Toronto was a brilliant and enthusiastic affair. Twenty thousand people in the city on these days were every province in the Dominion and every state in the Union were represented. It was the largest gathering Toronto has yet seen. The delegates were highly delighted with their reception. Premier Hardy was one of the visitors on behalf of the State in an able address. Major Fleming attended the proceedings of the city while Mr. Cameron, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, officiated in his customary vigorous manner in behalf of the church. "Many meetings were held and many difficult topics discussed. Music was everywhere, the Pavilion was jammed, the Metropolitan was filled, the Toronto Hotel and the city hall were full. The city was a hive of activity. Everything conspired to make a successful convention. The glorious summer weather, the admirable arrangements, and considerable forethought of a wide awake reception committee, the splendid accommodation of the episcopal funds and churches of the city, the generous hospitality and warm welcome of the citizens together with the enthusiastic and intellectual spirit of the convention, all conspired to make a successful one. The delegates and visitors left for their homes and their preparation at the hands of Canadians.

A resolution was also passed calling upon the Dominion Government to provide for a straight yea and nay vote on Prohibition and without any complication by mixing a revenue question with that of Prohibition.

No Allens Need Apply.

(Toronto World.)

We are glad to see that the Government is about to enforce its right in law in Western Canada so as to protect Canadian workmen during the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway. Half a dozen different laws against aliens exist in the United States and it is not until time reciprocal treaties are made that they are applied to the Canadians on this side of the line. The rail for the Crow's Nest Railway are not on their way out west. The work of construction will go on all summer and employment will be afforded to thousands of men. None but Canadians should get the benefit of this or any other employment that is to be had. We cannot enforce the law too stringently. The effect of the imposition at the 3-cent-a-day tax on aliens in Pennsylvania has been to exclude any one but United States citizens from obtaining employment in that state. It is the responsibility of labor are made responsible for the payment of the tax and sooner than have the trouble of collecting it they are engaging no aliens at all. That is the effect of the Pennsylvania law.
