

## SHIP SWEEPINGS.

A Man Who Makes His Living From the Waves Gathered on Yacht.

I claim to be the proprietor of the cheapest shop in London, and with out some of the poorest of the poor would have to go even when the price of a meal or a pint of beer was too dear. Emerson Williams increased interference in politics by attacking the government ranks while the ranks of the Socialists and discontents are swelling day by day.

It is generally admitted that the conference between Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been fruitless and the cost over all above them kept down to a minimum so that the bonded debt is light. The best of this was paid off and the pledges, station houses and permanent sites in as good condition as they were when they were sold; large sums having been expended on improvements. While this is good, it is still bad if there are no drives from Sir William Van Horne and Vice-President.

Mr. Thomas Whalen, one of the oldest citizens of Chatham, Ont., and at one time possessed of considerable wealth, died there Friday aged 87.

The Canadian Tempest Act which has been in effect for nearly a year has been defeated.

It is confidently expected by the United States commission at present in London that Great Britain will attend the International Peace Conference to be held in Washington.

It is announced that the Hon. Winston Churchill, elder son of the late Lord Randolph Churchill, will stand for Parliament in the Conservative interest at the next election.

The Duke of Cambridge, a son of the Duke of Cambridge, has been appointed to the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, and is to receive a commission in the Royal Navy.

The body of Sir John Board of Trade, who mysteriously disappeared, was found in St. John River, N.B., below the city.
