At first the Markdale goal was pressed hard but was relieved by Stephenson on a pass from Tuck, then the Shelburne etical came within an ace of being penetrated, but the defence of both teams had not put in weeks of steady practice for naught and again the ball travelled to the Markdale goal and after fifteen minutes of hard work in which Tuck showed himself to be the star goal keeper of the league by a pretty piece of combination play McKay got an open shot and put the rubber through thereby notching the first point for Shelburne. Then there was a scene of wild confusion and excitement, the Shelburne team supporters rushed on the field and crawled all over their idols and each other in the excitement of the moment. Although Shelburne scored first game they had really no right to do so for the play was more around their flags than play was resumed it only took Markdale half an hour to put themselves together and tie the score the trick being done by Matthews on a pass from Dugan to Campbell to Matthews. Right here a feature which could not help but influence the game was observed, namely, that Markdale had the speedier lot of players and were better trained and stronger men, but Shelburne were the better stick handlers.

From this fact it was seen that the smallness of the grounds interfered greatly with the playing of the Markdale team.

In the third game checking was harder than ever, neither team daring to let the other have any advantage. It was in this and the following game that Markdale's home showed up well; they simply played rings around the stonewall defence of the Dauntless 18 minutes before they succeeded in scoring making it 2 to 1 in favor of Markdale. Campbell by a clever run after some nice passing further out succeeded in putting the ball past Shelburne goal keeper. The third game was Markdale's all the way everyone took a shot or so at the Shelburne goal and time and again Mickey McKim the foxey point of Shelburne was called on to use his most forcible methods to save his goal, but after 14 minutes play Campbell again scored for Markdale, score 2 and only forty-nine minutes to play. It looked like a sure thing for the Northern colts.

Shelburne came along with a brilliant burst of speed, and every man on the team worked like a Trojan. It took the red shirted players from Shelburne 13 minutes to take the fifth game, in which Matthews, of Markdale, was badly cut over the eye, forcing, him to retire from the field, and Markdale played 11 men to 12. In a minute Shelburne allied again, tying the score. Then there was real excitement, and to say the least the people from the different localities were almost mad, fairly beside themselves. When Shelburne took the seventh game in 24 minutes, there was only a short time to play, and they simply defended their flags till Referee Craig's whistle blew. Then the masses played, the players were hoisted on their admirers' shoulders, and the march for the hotel was begun.
