

Postmaster-General Minister introduced a bill in the House of Commons on Friday last to amend the postage act which contains two parts, one reducing the rate on letters from three to two cents per ounce, the other imposing a rate of half a cent on newspapers. Sir Charles Tupper offers opposition to the bill, but we have a two cent postage stamp.

The question was a grave one and it was the duty of the Government to consider it well. The Government in coming to a conclusion and in communicating it to the members of the House."
