

There is nothing so injurous to peroad as water when it is allowed to stand in the ditches and sonk into the oal. Water expands on freezing and the more there is under the road and bove frost live the greater the injury. n freezing the particle of soil in imediate contact with the water are first ontracted. When room for expansion luses within the body of the soil itself, owing to the aturated condition the surface is uplicayed. When thawing takes place to subsoil will be found honey combed ready to settle and sink beneath the truffic. It is therefore of the utmost importance that the soil be elieved of all water as quickly as pos sible by underdraining. The impassible condition of most roads in Onarib during the spring, often axle deep with mud is to be attributed very

argely to the wet soil which has been oneycombed by the frost. In order to over come this difficulty wherever we are troubled with water where the rouls are already graded up; the best method in my opinion would be to take ten or twelve inches out of the centre f the road whatever width would be ecessary and fill it in with small stone within two inches of the surface thus leaving a shoulder to hold the top dressing which should be crushed stone or the best grayel available. There should be a small drain on each side of the road about four rods apart vel with bottom of the stone to draw the water off the road-bed into the ditches. Now in regard to the statute labor system I claim it is a failure and has thoroughly proved itself to be so. Any person that has carefully observed the manner is which the work has een performed in the different divisions, will read by admit that this is the case, there is no system in it; it is simply a waste of time, labor and money and we are bound from year to year plodding through mud and mire.
