Exchange Cleanings

Hanover Post.—"Ordered to be committed for forty days to the common jail of the county" was the order made by His Honor Judge Morrison upon the examination of a judgment debtor at Division Court here on Monday of this week. There is perhaps no more careful, patient and meritorious Judge in Ontario than Judge Morrison and he is always exceedingly careful in imposing an order on a debtor, but in the instance referred to he was of the opinion that the debtor had deliberately ignored the orders, possibly made and treated them with contempt without having made any effort to pay the debt, and he said that if such conduct was permitted, and allowed to continue, that judgment summons might as well be abandoned. There is in some quarters a feeling against judgment summons proceedings and public sympathy is usually manifested with the debtor, people frequently getting that the creditor is often quite as hard up as the debtor, and that through the extravagance, waste, drunkenness, carelessness or costliness of a debtor, or of a number of them, an honest, industrious, careful manufacturer or older man of business is often driven to the wall. Every man has a right to pay his debts and if he is able to do so, any machinery that will compel him is all right if properly used, and is required, for in these days there are too many who appear to think that they have only a right to pay such debts as they cannot by any trick escape paying.

Hamilton's Fall

Just one year ago this month, John Hamilton, then reeve of Shelburne, was tried at the General Sessions of the Peace for the county of Dufferin, at Orangeville, on the charge of forgery and was acquitted by a majority of juror testimony. To-day Hamilton is not already captured, is a fugitive from justice and a ruined man. While he may have sympathy for his family and his friends, we must not forget the social, domestic and financial ruin that has been wrought on other families by his influence. It has been painfully apparent for some time past that John Hamilton had become morally bankrupt, having lost all sense of right and wrong, and that his promptings were solely those of an overweening ambition to become a wealthy and prominent man in the community. The story of this man's crime, and that of his deeds, is a blot on our community equalled daily by the wrong cases. As Judge McClellan remarked at Hamilton, neither the property is safe where such a state of things is allowed to exist. One result of these prosecutions will be less robbery in our courts of justice, and a change cannot come too soon.—Shelburne Economist.
