Lieutenant Governor Cameron received an enthusiastic reception at Regatta last week.

First class steamship Canadian steamship of Great Britain have been raised from \$1,000,000.

The United States has paid the claims of the Canadian seafarers \$1,000,000 as settled in the Dredging on award.

The two great bodies of water lying east and west of us cover 100 million square miles, the Atlantic 25,000,000 and the Pacific 75,000.

Uncle Sam has his eagle eye on Hawaii and the vote in favor of annexing the same to the United States has been carried in the house of representatives by 201 to 9.

Lieutenant Montgomery Moore, who has been in command of the British troops in Canada, has been succeeded by Lord William Frederick Ernest Seymour.

On the ground that wheeling freight and farmers' horses the township council of Osgoode, Carlton county, have passed a bylaw prohibiting bicycling in the township.

Rev C. C. Dowell, once stationed at Owen Sound and later at Flesherton and chairman of the Owen Sound district died his home in Gowanville on Sunday aged 75 years.

Peterborough has a popular vote abolished the ward system to advantage of the legislature of last session by the Local Legislature and elect aldermen one for every 1000 of population by general vote.

The C P R and G. T. Railways have agreed to add a rate of 10 cents on merchandise from points in Ontario to export points in the United States. The new rates are in advance on the old of about ten per cent and go into effect on July 11.

It is reported that the Standard Oil Company has bought out the Imperial Oil Works and has a five year lease of every oil refining plant in Canada. With the majority of gas oil well recently discovered and the excellent facilities for refining possessed by the Company, there is no expectation that there will be any increase of prices to the consumers.

When the body was exhumed the Drs did not find the slightest mark upon it and no reason for the restriction about viewing it.

Friday and Saturday last were two long days of desperado fighting between the American and Spanish soldiers at Santiago. The Spaniards are reported to have fought like devils but were slaughtered and driven back by the Americans whose loss was also heavy there being reported of their men about 1000 wounded or killed. Monday's Despatches also report Cervara's squadron destroyed.

A few minutes after separating Kring saw an object moving in the thicket and thought it to be an animal. He fired and coming up found it to be his companion whom he had shot dead. Miss Julian of Montreal was drowned while boating at Higates Springs. While trying to board a train at St Thomas Geo Henderson of Cornwall was instantly killed. John McEwan of Toronto was drowned while bathing at Weston. A little son of Robt Knight of Emerson, Man, fell down a well only one foot in diameter and was drowned. His body was removed by a grapping apparatus. Robt Mulligan, a young man of Ottawa, was drowned in the Chaudiere. Peter Weaver was drowned at Stirling while bathing. T. E. Rowe, a brakeman, was killed by a train at Trenton. The storm on Sunday caused a yacht to capsize at Mimico and two young men from Toronto were drowned. The storm also caused a yacht to capsize at Hamilton and three young men of that city were drowned.
