**BEETHOVEN'S BIRTHPLACE.**  
An American Biography of the Composer  
First, Awakened Interest in Bonn.  
Mr. H. E. Krebber contributes to the Century an article on "The Beethoven Museum at Bonn." Mr. Krebber visits a musical student cannot visit the Beethoven Museum at Bonn without thinking of Alexander W. Taylor. It almost as much a monument to the distinguished genius, without Taylor's labors, indeed, it is doubtful if the museum would ever have come into being. More than anything else, it is the discovery which he made touching the antecedents of Beethoven and the musical genius which he has endeavored to stir up that feeling of local patriotism in a special circle of art-loving citizens of Bonn, with which we are all familiar in the purchase of the house in which the composer was born, its preservation from ruin, rescued from degradation, and dedication to the purpose of a museum. It is honor—let us hope, in a secular sense—to be so.  
It is the birthplace of the large infusion of sentiment in the German nation, that so long a time was permitted to forget his death, of Beethoven and the taking of these who and where he was born, and the fact that he was born in a tenement house, the birthplace of the composer.  
The parents had occupied lodgings in three houses before he was six years old. He had gone away from Bonn when he was twelve years old, and he never went back. There were no domestic ties to keep him. The fulfillment of his mission was that he should die in Vienna, whether he had been sent by his mother, the Elector of Cologne, who was his guardian, or whether he had been sent by his own choice. He died in Vienna, but his father had had the credit of his greatest son. Only slowly did there dawn on the public mind the realization of the glory which it had in the person of the composer.
