The name of The Adelaide (South Aus-  
tralia) Advertiser for June 14th just  
received, gives the particulars of a trial  
which proves that even in that far  
away country the Dr Williams Medi-

counterfeits as it is here at home in  
Canada. In the trial in question Frank  
Ashley and William Smith were shown  
to have been engaged in offering a sub-  
stitute for Dr Williams Pink Pills,  
claiming that the substitute was the  
same as that just celebrated medicine.  
Both men were placed under arrest on  
a charge of obtaining money under  
false pretences and conspiring to defraud  
the public and evidence was heard be-  
fore the Chief Justice of the Criminal  
Court. The defendants' lawyer made a  
strong fight. After being held over, 40 in  
this case of the jury, after a short ab-  
sence from the court returned a verdict of  
guilty in both cases. The Chief Justice  
defered sentence until the close of the trials.  
In addressing the jury he said: "The  
court strongly concurred in the views of  
the substituted and the dangers to the  
victim that may ensue from this farce  
and too common practice." To  
those who are not familiar with  
the trial, it is recommended that they  
read the account in the paper.

The following extract, taken from  
Provincial Board Commissioner Campbell's  
recent address in Orillia, may interest  
our readers. "Planks are not an  
economic material for sidewalks.  
Timber subject to alternate moisture  
from the ground and rain, and heat from  
the sun, cannot help decay rapidly.  
A plank poorly constructed will  
last five years, then repairs commence.  
At the end of fifteen years the walk  
has cost as much for repairs as it cost  
in the first place, therefore the average  
life of a plank walk may be seven years.  
The best material for sidewalks is arti-  
ficial stone. The first cost of this  
is nearly three times that of plank.  
Plank averages about 50 per square foot; arti-  
ficial stone 12c square foot. The latter,  
when properly laid, will last probably  
a century; it has been on some Toronto  
streets for thirty years and is ap-  
parently as good as ever."
