Artemesia Council

The municipal council of the town
of Artemesia met in the town hall,
Fletherton, on Saturday, March 4, 1899,
all the members present, the reeve in
the chair. The minutes of last meeting
were read and confirmed.

A letter from the superintendent of
the county of Wellington house of ref-
uge admitting inmates was read.

The following accounts were presented
and read, viz.: Municipal World for
stationery, \$2.37, and sub-
scription, \$3; William Watson for
coffin and digging grave for Mrs. Mc-
Millan, an infant, \$10; W. Barlowe,
for hall, \$2.25.

Browns No. 55, to appoint officers
for legs, and \$10, to letting town hall,
were introduced by Mr. Boyd and read
a first time.

Donald McLeod and deputations from S.S. No. 146, waited upon the
council, pursuant to application, to
change the boundaries of said sections.

The auditors presented their report
on amounts of \$38.

Thompson, Tair. That bylaws 529
and 530 be now read a second time,
carried.

Kelli, J. Read on. That council go
into committee on by-laws 507 and 509
—carried.

Council went into committee on by-
laws 507 and 509, Mr. Kelly in charge,
Committee on Finance and returned bylaws
507 and 509 back to council resolved,
the vote in the chair.

Read State that bylaws 507 and
509 be read over again next session of
this council, read to be read a third
time, carried.

Read State that the account of
the Municipal World for stationery,
\$2.37, and subscription, \$3, be paid, —
carried.

Mr. Boyd, Tair. That the account
of W. Barlowe, for hall wood for hall,
\$2.25, be carried.

Mr. Boyd, Tair. That the account
of Mr. McMillan, for funeral and burial
of Mrs. McMillan, be paid, —carried.

Read State that J. McArthur be
sent to the office of the Collector of
Hector Station, for having no personal
property at that place, —carried.

Read State that Messrs. Kelly and Thompson be a committee
to find the auditor's report—
exacted.

Thompson, Tair. That this council
have heard a full view of the question
as to changing the boundaries of school
sections Nos. 6 and 13, by attaching
lots 1 and 14 to section No. 6, and attach-
ing the same to No. 13, do not think
the change advisable, and that the
application of it be referred for said pur-
pose be not entertained, —carried.

Kelly, Tair. That the auditors
report for S.S. No. 146 be suggested, and the auditors be
paid \$10 each for their services, and
that they be entitled to pamphlet form for distribution, —carried.

Read State that when the timber
delivered at the horse-shoe hill is in-
spected and found in accordance with
the same be paid for, —carried.

Kelly, Tair. That the reeve be
authorized to draw necessary funds
to pay witness fees in suit, —carried.

Mr. Boyd, Tair. That the reeve, Messrs.
Thompson, Boyd, Kelly, and the clerk
are hereby appointed to attend court at
the S.S. No. 146, on the 17th inst in suit
McMillan v. Artemesia, —carried.

Fourthly, Carbonic acid is always
present, as may be shown by the action
on lime water. It may be inferred that
the sleepiness, headache and lassitude
which follows prolonged inhalation
of tobacco fumes, are due largely

oil of tobacco contains a fluid alkaloid,
nicotine, a volatile substance, having
an empyreumatic odor, and a dark
