AND whereas such application has been signed by three-fourths in numbers of the occupiers of the slops of the class or classes aforesaid the Municipality, and the Council has approved of and consented to give effect to said application, pursuant to the provisions of section 44 of chapter 257 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario 1897.
THEREFORE the said Municipal Council of the Village of Markdale,

hereby enacts as follows :-1. THAT this bylaw shall repeal the early closing bylaw passed in the year 1893 and shall be known as "The Early Closing Bylav of 1809," and shall take effect from and after the 29th day of May next, and that this bylaw be published in one of the regular issues of The Markdale Standard newspaper before said date.

2. THE words "shops" and "places of business" shall have the meaning assigned to the word "shop" by subsection (A) of section 44, chapter 257 R SO 1877, and the word "closed" shall have the nathing assigned by subsection 45 O 1897

3. THAT from the said 29th day of May A D 1899 all shops or places usiness in the Village of Markdale in which dry-goods, groceries, clothing. gents furnishings, boots and shoes, ewellry, furniture or hardware are exposed or offered for sale by retail shall be closed and remain closed on each and every day of the week during the whole of the yoar, (Wednesdays and Saturdays excepted) at and during any time or hours between Six o'clock in the afternoon of such days and Five o'clock in the forenoon of the

next following day or days.
4. A shop in which trades of two or more classes are carried on, shall be closed for the purpose of all such trades at the hour and during the period of time at or during which it is bereby required to be closed for the purpose of that one of such trades heren before designated which is the principal trade carried on in said shop.

5. EVERY occupier, of any such shop or store as is herein before specified who shall keer his shop open by himself, agent or servand within the period of time specified and proscribed by clause Three of this bylaw, and conrary to the letter and spirit of said by law, shall upon conviction of said infringement before my Justice of the Peace of the County of Grey, be liable to a fine not to exceed the sum of ten dollars and costs; and in default of payment thereof and in the event of no distress being found out of which the same can be levied, such occupier, agent or servict, shall be liable to inr-prisonment with or without hard labor in the County gaol of the County of Grey, for any period not exceeding Twenty-one day






