A Euphrasia man remarked last week that the only really bad road between Rocklyn and the C.P.R. station was the Main street of Markdale. Everybody wants a first class permanent roadway for our main business street. We were told at the beginning of the year that we had this year an energetic and progressive levee backed up by a good Council and that the work of the Council would be pushed along in a business-like way. If so why are these Main Street improvements, not looked after? Everybody wants the work done and at once, if done now the debtors for cost of road may be issued and sold with the sidewalk debentures. Why don't the Reeve and Council go to work? Private citizens by petitions forced the Council to act in the matter of sidewalks. ### Press Excursion

The Canadian Press Association have made arrangements for a trip to the Coast. The excursion will start from Toronto and Montreal the 1st August and join at North Bay the following morning.

Starting from North Bay on the morning of August 2nd the excursionists will spend August 3rd at Port Arthur, August 4th at Port Fortage, and August 5th at Winnipeg. Westward from Winnipeg a stop of five or six hours each will be made at Portage la Prairie, Brandon, Regina and Calgary. Banff will be reached on Wednesday night, August 8th. A stay of two days and three nights will be made in the mountains: At Banff, Ledgum, Field, and Glacier. This and the stay at Winnipeg, breaks the westward journey. The train will arrive at Vancouver at noon on Sunday, August 14th, the making a 12-day journey across the continent.

After visiting Victoria, the return journey from Vancouver will begin at 10 a.m. on Thursday, August 17th, going by rail to Arrowhead, August 18th, boat to Victoria, August 19th, to Seattle, August 20th, to Tacoma, August 21st, to Portland, August 22nd, to Astoria, August 23rd, to Vancouver, August 24th. Those who do not wish to leave from Vancouver, on the return trip, may stay there for two days, leaving to catch the boat down the lakes, which leaves Port Williams August 25th; the passengers reaching Toronto at noon on August 27th.
