How to Carve a Turkey

Have confidence and pay strict at tention to the task in hand. Smile at table gossip even if you don't hear it. Put your fork into the firm flesh at the back of the leg. Place the knife under the second joint, close to the breast. Draw the knife toward you. Cut only skin deep and use a little wrist power. Don't hack; carve.

carver will be demonstrated. Get a firm place for your fork-just underneath the breast bone, and cut thin slices of white meat toward the wing. When your knife striks the bones of the wing stop. Be sure to cut the slices thin. Thick cuts of white meat are an abomination. When you have cut close to the breast bone turn your turkey. Now, that is not so easy as it looks. Awkwardly done-if you allow your attention to become distracted—the bird is likely to slip from the dish on to the table. Run your fork into the ribs, and get a firm grip. Put the knife under the breast bone till your are assured it is not likely to slip, and then-lift. Don't waste any time. Get the turkey around as quickly as you can, and then begin on the other side. Follow instructions previously given. Carve away the white meat toward the wing. It will be a little bit awkward at first to cut toward the left, but you!ll soon get used to it. So far as tid bits are concerned, you will, of course, use your own judgment. You are supposed to know best who is to receive the wishbone, the parson's nose, and other coveted morsels so dear to lovers of turkey. The thing is to get at them. In finding the wishbone, get your knife under the front of the breast, and cut

toward the neck; cut, don't tug. Here's another choice morsel carvers generally overlook—the oyster hone. You are now getting into the most delicious part of the turkey to the
