The County Council.

The County Council met Monday eve
Nov. 20, in the assembly hall of the
court house, Owen Sound, with all the
members present. The warden, Mr.

Chas. Gordon, made a brief address in
opening the session. The minutes were
then read by the clerk, Mr. John
Rutherford. Memorials were read
from the Dundas and Glengary county
council to petition the Ontario Legis
lature to remove excessive fees which
are preventing many reaching for the
higher education.

A communication was read from
John Kerr appealing against the in
action of the Council with respect to
appointing arbitrators for a new school
section in Normanby and Egremont.
This was referred to the education com
mittee.

A letter from Magistrate Spencer was
read re a child sent to Minden, and
asking the Council to assume expense
till the child was sixteen years of age.
Referred to finance committee.

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A memorial from the county of Victoria,
concerning a petition to the
Dominion Government asking that the
parliament establish a permanent board
of arbitrators to settle all disputes and
differences between corporations, principally
railroads, and the private indi
viduals concerned.

The school inspector's report at the
afternoon session showed that 221
pupils tried the entrance examinations
and 136 passed; 121 tried the junior
leaving examinations and 72 passed.
North Grey show'd a decrease in the
number writing on these examinations,
while the South had an increase of 15.

An account of \$11.75 was read from
Arthur J. Ross. Referred to Finance
committee.

Wm. McCormack sent in an appeal
asking that he be given a free license
to peddle small wares. He is an old
man 75 years of age.

A memorial from the Prisoners' Aid
Association asked for the co-operation
of the Council to assist confirmed
inmates. The idea was endorsed by
all the important medical associations.

An account from The Sun for \$3.75
for advertising was referred to the
Finance committee, as was also an ac
count of \$18.10 from the town clerk of
Thornbury.

Armstrong & Telford sent in an ap
peal on behalf of the section of the
village of Greyport lying within the
limits of Grey asking to have it made a

post office. The speakers took fifteen min
utes each. This question, judging
from the arguments advanced, is a
difficult one to decide. To oblige one
portion of the community the other
must be discommodeated through taking
support from other sections.

Derby petitioned to have the town
by law No. 5 ratified. This was to
legalize the closing of side roads 15 and
16, between concessions 9 and 10, in
the township of Derby. Mr. Harness,
reverend of Derby, addressed the Council
in support of the ratification.

A little irregularity occurred here
and a by-law introduced by Mr. Wat
son to appoint Judge Creaser, W. A.
Grier and John McDonald arbitrators
to establish a new school section in
Ephraim. After having reached as
far as the third reading a letter was
read from Judge Creaser and on the
strength of this the matter was referred

back to the Education committee.
The Council then adjourned till 10
o'clock next morning.

Council resumed its sessions on
Tuesday. There was, however, no
business of importance transacted at
the morning session beyond the con
sideration of a number of accounts, all
of which were referred to the Finance
Committee to report upon. During
the afternoon the various committees
met, and the evening session was given
over to Provincial Road. Instructor
Campbell.

The County Council resumed bus
iness at 2.30 p.m. Wednesday. A num
ber of accounts were read and referred
to the County Property committee. A
few were referred to the Finance and
Road and Bridge committees.

The report of Mr. A. Grier, school
inspector, was read, stating that the
schools were all inspected, and the
teachers found duly qualified; but he
called attention to the fact that the
attendance as a whole was very
irregular.

The chairman of the Finance com
mittee read report No. 1 recommend
ing the payment of a number of ac
counts and also a free licence be
granted to Mr. McCormack to peddle
small wares in a one-horse cart.

The Road and Bridge committe
recommended the payment of a num
ber of bridge repair accounts and that
the ratification of Derby by-law No. 5
to close a road in Derby be laid over
for consideration till the next meeting
of the Council.

On motion of Messrs. Preston and
Paterson by-law 573, to guarantee
\$5,000 debentures in the village of
Dundalk, for the purposes of electric
lighting, passed its third reading. Mr.
Preston strongly insisted on the insertion
of the clause stating what the deb
entures were for.

By-law 572 appointing Judge Creaser
and Messrs. W. A. Grier and John
McDonald arbitrators for the forma
tion of a new school section in Ephraim
was passed and engrossed in the
minute book.

After some uninteresting routine
business the Council adjourned till
next day.

On Thursday morning a number of
accounts were recommended by the
various committees and were ordered
for payment.

The question of appointing arbit
rators to form a new school section in
Ephraim was again a bone of conten
tion. Two deputations were present,
one for and one against the by-law.
These addressed the council (six speak
ers in all) and illustrated their arg
uments with maps.

The school inspector's report at the
afternoon session showed that 2
