County Court & Sessions

The December sittings of the County Court, also of the sessions of the Peace for the County of Grey opened in the Court House Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 12, at 2 p. m. His Honor Judge Creaser presided. There were but two civil cases on the docket.

Carr vs. Bradley—An action on a lumber deal. The case was settled out of court. W. J. Hatton for plaintiff; Teetzal & Teetzal and W. L. Ross (Hamilton) for defendants.

Bailey vs. Gardner—was an action for board and for the value of supplies furnished defendant while plaintiff and defendant were working on defendant's farm. The defendant counter-claimed for the value of grain and for work. The balance of the plaintiff's claim over the defendant's counter-claim was fixed at \$80. Decision as to the question of costs was reserved. Lucas, Wright & Batson for plaintiff; MacKay & Sampson for defendant.

The Grand Jury brought in the following Bills:—The Queen vs. John McQuarrie, Theft, True Bill; The Queen vs. Edward Motley, damaging slide trees, True Bill; The Queen vs. Herman Mott, Theft, True Bill; The Queen vs. Fletcher and Sinclair, Burglary, True Bill.

Reg. vs. John McQuarrie—The greater part of Wednesday was occupied in the hearing of the Crown case against John McQuarrie for stealing seven hens belonging to Euphemia and Christina MacDonald. All the parties live in the township of Osprey. The accused claimed that the hens belonging to the neighbors got mixed up with his, and that the seven hens that he killed were his own, or that he thought they were, and were not stolen. Verdict, Not Guilty. A. G. MacKay for the Crown, Lucas, Wright & Batson for defence.

Queen vs. Edward Motley—was begun Wednesday afternoon and occupied the greater part of Thursday. The prisoner is charged with having killed four valuable roan shade trees belonging to Mrs. McKenzie of Durham. Several witnesses were called by the Crown, including Neil M. Campbell, Public School Inspector, Constables Carson and Whalen, Mr. McKenzie and others. The evidence in support of the case is circumstantial, the witnesses claiming that a knife which was found on Mr. Motley at the time of his arrest, owing to nicks in it, could be clearly traced as the knife that did the damage. The Counsel addressed the jury Thursday afternoon, and the Judge made his charge Friday morning. The jury disagreed.—O. S. Advertiser.
