Presbytery of Owen Sound

The Presbytery met in Knox Church, Owen Sound, Dec. 19, at 10 a. m. and was opened with devotional exercises led by Dr. McRobbie. Rev. Mr. Simpson moderator. In the opening of the afternoon session special prayers were offered for the Empire in connection with the strife in South Africa by Messrs. Simpson, Eastman and Dr. Waits. The call to the Rev. Mr. Burnett from Whitechurch and Langside to the Presbytery of Maitland was taken up. Rev. W. T. Hall represented Maitland Presbytery and commissioners from Keedy and Desboro were heard. Resolutions were read opposing the removal of Rev. Mr. Burnett. Rev. Mr. Hill made a strong plea for the Presbytery of Maitland. Rev. Mr. Burnett intimated that owing to the present health of Mrs. Burnett, his duty seemed to lead him not to accept the call but to resign his present charge and seek work for a time in the Highlands of Ontario—Muskoka. The call was then set aside and his resignation taken up, and after deliberation by the Presbytery, was accepted to take effect on the 8th, January next. Rev. Mr. McMabb was appointed to declare the pulpit vacant on the 14th January, and to act as the moderator of session during the vacancy. Presbytery expressed its sympathy with Mr. and Mrs. Burnett in their affliction, and cordially commended him to the Assembly's Home-Mission committee for an appointment in Muskoka.

Rev. Mr. Graham was requested to arrange for the supply of Williamsford for the coming three months and the committee in charge of the arrangements of Williamsford was continued. Dr. Fraser presented the report of the committee on Remission from the Assembly. (1) Aids to social work was approved with numerous minor changes suggested. (2) The college of ex-moderators was disapproved, but Presbytery recommended that it shall lie with Presbyteries to nominate persons suitable for the office of moderator of assembly; such nominations to be reported to the clerk of Assembly in time to make the list of such nominations, and intimate it to the church, at least one month before the date of the meeting of Assembly, and that the first business of the General Assembly after reporting the roll, shall be the election from this list of a moderator by ballot and without discussion. (3) The enlargement of the powers of Synods was approved.

Death of D. L. Moody.

EAST NORTHFIELD, Mass., Dec. 22.—Dwight L. Moody, the famous evangelist, died at noon to-day.

Dwight Lyman Moody was born at Northfield, Mass., Feb. 8, 1837. He worked on a farm until he was 17, and then went to Boston, where he accepted a situation as clerk in a shoe store. In 1856 he went to Chicago, where he entered actively into the work in the slums. During the war he was in the service of the Christian Commission and afterwards became a lay missionary of the Y. M. C. in Chicago. In 1878 he was joined by Ira D. Baker, the sweet singer, and went to England, where he conducted a series of week-day religious services, and attracted large and enthusiastic audiences.

In 1875 the two evangelists returned to the States, and aroused religious fervor by meetings similar to those held in England. In 1885 he re-visited Britain, and met with much additional success in the work. He was the author of several religious works, among the number being "Heaven," "Secret Power," and "Way to God and How to Find It."
