A Strange Suicide

The village of Thornbury was thrown into a state of great excitement last Saturday week, when it became known that one of their best known townsman had ended his life by his own hand. It was the first suicide that ever took place in Thornbury, so far as is known. Charles Shaw lived alone with his mother. He was 32 years of age and had been born in Thornbury. During his life he worked hard, and at the time of his death owned a dwelling in the town and two large farms well stocked with cattle. Six months ago, within two days of each other, his last. sister and balf sister died from consumption, the former at her home and the latter in this town. Both funerals took place on the same day. Since then his friends noticed that Shaw had grown melancholy through fear that he would become a victim of consumption. On Wednesday of last week he called at a hardware merchant's store and purchased a revolver. On being told by the merchant that he had no cart-Miss Mary Clugston is visiting ridges to fit the revolver, Shaw went who had the pleasure of his acquaintto a neighbor's home and procured the necessary cartridges. On Friday night he made his will, bequeathing his money and estate to his near relatives. Shortly after midnight the following morning he arose and, hurrying to the woodshed in the rear of his line, and Mrs. Lewis Ludlow of Port home, fired a bullet through his head. His mother, on hearing the noise, ryshed whence it came and found her son lying on his face en the floor in the woodshed. He was dead. Dr. Herbert, the corner, who investigated the case, did not think an inquest was necessary.—Thornbury Herald.
