GENERAL NOTES

The efforts to have the Canadian exhibit at the Paris exhibition closed on Sundays have proved futile and Canada must in this conform to the wishes of the Paris directorate. .

The population of Owen Sound is now 8,854 an increase of 459 during the past year. Our county town is forging ahead and will doubtless soon be the baby city of the province.

The Book and Publishing Committee of the Methodist Book Room, Toronto, have voted from the profits of this year's business \$11,000, to the Superanuation Fund of the Church.

The United Presbyterian Church and the Pree Church in Scotland are soon to be united which will be the happy consumation of a movement which has been agitated to that end for the past four years. The Free Church has 404,-928 communicants and 1,114 ministers while in the United Presbyterian there are about 200,000 communicants and (14 ministers.

Lord Roberts is forging shead. Kroonstad has fallen before him and President Steyn has fled to Lindley a point 45 miles east of Kroonstad. Lord Roberts entered Kroonsted at the head of his army and the scenes enacted and rejoiding at Bloemfontein, under simiilar conditions, are said to have been repeated. In old London the rejoicing at the relief of Kimberley and Ladysmith was repeated. Kroonstad will now be converted into the advanced base of supplies for the operations in the transvaal. The Boers are now said to be trekking to the Vaal River and numbers of the burgers making for their homes. There is said to be a quarrel between the Free Staters and the Transvaalers which has become so acute that the latter have decided to leave their allies whom they accuse of cowardice. The Free Staters are tired. of the war which has meant loss of life and destruction of their own property for them; the fighting on their soil is thought to be practically over.


