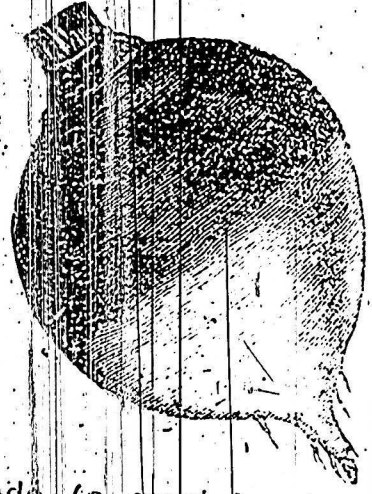

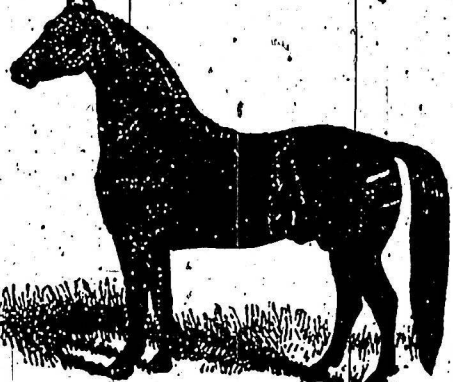
Court of Revision

GENERAL NOTES

Arthur McIntyre, the thirteen year old lad who shot and killed his father in Toronto a fortnight ago has been committed for trial. The charge is likely to be manslaughter.

The Cardwell Conservatives have nominated Mr. Robt. Johnston as their candidate for the Commons at the Dominion election which some of our leading politicians make bold to state will be held early this fall. Both parties are diligent and vigorously preparing for the contest.

Rev. William Patterson of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Toronto, has been called to Lathrup Church, Philadelphia. Cooke's Church will do all in their power to retain their popular pastor who ministers to a membership of 1,400 and congregation of 2,500. Fourteen years ago when Mr. Patterson was inducted there were only 100 members on the roll.

The relief of the plucky little garrison at Marking is another link in the chain of success attending Lord Roberts' movements. The good news so anxiously waited for set the British Empire all a flame and the enthusiasm and rejoicing surpassed that, even greater as it was, manifested at the relief of Kimberley and Ladysmith. Braden Powell is the hero of England to day and his name will be read in history in long years to come as the gallant officer who successfully withstood the seven months' siege of Mafeking against great odds.

Much is being said just now about the abuse of the franking privilege. That privilege inevitably leads to ultimate abuse is the best argument for the abolition of the privileges; and the only way to stop the abuse of franking is to abolish franking. Members of all our Parliaments in Canada are paid salaries, and out of their salaries let them pay postage on their correspondence. Franking was abolished in the United Kingdom over half a century ago, and there, remember, members of Parliament are paid neither salary nor " mileage." Not only is franking a fraud on the postal revenue, but it exercises a decidedly immoral influence.
