The house should be stripped of all ovable fixtures, including feed and ater vessels, nests and perches. Renove and burn all litter. If you can make the house tight fumigate theroughly with sulphur, hydrocyanic acid gas or bisulphide of carbon. The gas treatment is the most effective, but great care must be exercised in using . Multiply the length, breadth and beight of your house together, and to every cubic foot of contents use 20 gram of best grade potassium cyanide one-half more best sulphuric acid and ne-half more water than acid. But he acid in a stone or glass jar, pour n the water and then put in the yanide, after which get out and shut the door quickly. Thus a house had been his saving, as he had not the resolution to break off of his own accord I heartily advise all women afflicted as I oz. Troy weight, of cyanide, 41-2 ozs., liquid measure, acid, and 6 3-4 ozs.

The nest boxes and perches should be thoroughly painted with kerosene and then whitewashed. To each gallon of lime wash add 1 oz. crude carbolic acid. Burn the nest boxes if they are old. If the house cannot be furnigated whitewash thoroughly, being sure that the wash reaches all crevices and cracks on walls, floor and coiling. In the bottom of each nest place a handful of tobacco stumps before putting in new nesting material. Dust the fowls well with insect or lice powder. If they roost in old sheds or wash can be put on very quickly and effectively. Kerosone emulsion is good remedy also.

POISONS IN PLANTS.

The berries of the yew have killed many persons, says the Scientific Amnowadays that it is not safe to eat. many peach pits or cherry kernels at once. Among the garden plants commonly in vogue which possess a poisonous nature, botanists mention the jonguil, white hyacinth and snow lrop, the narcissus being also particularly deadly so much so, indeed, that to chew a small scrap of one of these bulbs may result fatally, while the juice of the leaves is an emetic. There is enough opium in red poppies to do mischief, and the autumn crocus, if the blossoms are chewed, causes illness. The lobeliasare all dangerous, their juice, if swallowed, producing giddiness, with pains in the hotd. Lady's slipper poisons in the same way as does poison ivy. The bulbs seem to be the most harmful. Lilies-of-the-valley are also poisonous. The leaves and flowers of the oleander are deadly, and the bank of the catalpa tree is very mischievous. The water dropwort, when not in flower, resembles celery and is virulent.
