Fauson, balance of contract for printing \$17.50; Albert Latter, for repairing culvert on valley road \$1.50; Frank Thompson, to pay men for work on 3rd line \$6.25; Eber Smith for removing trees from 4th line 50c.

### THE PARTING TRIBUTE.

The parting remarks of Lord Roberts to the returning Canadians at Pretoria on Thursday last will be a pleasant spot in the memory of those who were present and particularly to those to whom the remarks were addressed. They were as follows:

"I cannot allow you to depart without expressing my thanks for and appreciation of your loyal services and excellent work, especially at Paardeberg, on February 27, I am sure the people of Canada will be pleased to hear how gallantly and how splendidly you have all behaved in action. Deeply I regret the losses you have suffered. I should have been happier if you had returned in your full strength. The regiment has had the luck of wounded; but no one could expect to pass through so arduous a campaign without losses. I am sorry that some of you are obliged to return sooner than the rest of the regiment, but I recognize the urgency of private affairs. I am confident that you and British people will never forget your services. If it should ever be my fortune to visit Canada, I hope to meet you all again.

The contingents have more than fulfilled our expectations in the Transvaal struggle, and it now remains for Canadians to give them a welcome which will outshine all other events of a like nature. It will not require any urging to do this, and while those who will return will be honored yet those who have been singled out to mingle with the dust of the South African veldts will not be forgotten, and many a city, town and hamlet will erect a memorial to one whose memory is undying. This first dip in the Empire's struggles has been a costly one but it has been the means of fashioning bonds of love and friendship between the mother country and Canada which will be lasting and beneficial to each in a hundred different ways.
