FLESHERTON EVENTS
(By our own Correspondent)
The annual meeting of the local branch of the A. and F. Bible Society was held in the Presbyterian church on Wednesday evening of last week but owing to the inclement evening the attendance was small. Rev. Dr. Frazer of Annapolis, delivered an address on the work of the parent society. The treasurer's report showed that \$38.05 had been raised by this branch during the past year. Officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, A. S. VanDusen; Sec., Rev. L. W. Thom; Treas., Wm. Henderson; Committee, Dr. Christie, T. J. Sheppard, Jeremiah Thompson; Depository, Robert Trimble.
Rev. L. W. Thom entertained the officers and teachers of the Presbyterian Sabbath School at the manse on Monday evening last week. The annual Christmas evening entertainment was arranged for.
On Wednesday afternoon of last week Mr. John S. Legate and Miss Eliza Jane Black, of the Toronto line, Artemesia, presented themselves at the Presbyterian manse to be joined in the bonds of matrimony. Rev. Mr. Thom was pleased to gratify their wish and soon pronounced the happy couple husband and wife. Mr. Albert Stinson and the bride's sister, Miss Sarah Black, discharged the duties of groomsmen and bridesmaid.
On Friday night last a six lamp chandelier in the Masonic hall fell and came to rest along with several of the lamps it contained. The janitor was in the act of lighting up but fortunately had not made the match connection with the wick when the drop occurred or a bad conflagration might have been the result. The carpet was saturated with the oil from the broken lamps.
Inspector Campbell paid the Flesherton public school a professional visit on Tuesday of last week and was much pleased with the school, there being marked evidence of progress and excellent work being done. The present efficient staff—Principal Slaughter, Misses Irwin and Meredith—have been re-engaged for 1901.
Mr. Alex. Reid, who is closing his twelfth year in Wright's school east of this village, has closed with his trustees for another year's service. Mr. Reid's long term of service in that progressive section speaks volumes for him as a teacher and the trustees have not been slow to recognize his worth.
Rev. S. D. Gaudin, missionary at Nelson House, Keewatin District, delivered a very interesting and at times touching address in the Methodist church Sabbath evening last on mission work among the Indians of the far north. At the close of his address Mr. Gaudin sang a hymn in Cree, the language of the red men among whom he has labored for nine years and whose temporal and spiritual interests lie near to his heart. Mr. Gaudin, who is accompanied by his wife and two children, are visiting his sister, Mrs. W. H. Linston, after which they will proceed to New Brunswick to visit Mrs. Gaudin's relatives before returning to their work.
The rain on Sunday and vanishing snow made thin congregations in the churches. Rev. Mr. Thom did not attempt Proton Station at night.
In accord with the resolution passed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in June last in which "the Assembly definitely recognizes the supreme importance of an advance in spiritual life, and to that end invites to special prayer and co-operation the entire membership, and especially the ministers and office-bearers of the church, throughout the coming year," the Orangeville Presbytery last week recommended to ministers and elders the holding of special evangelistic services throughout the Presbytery beginning with the New Year and appointed as committee for arrangement of plan Rev. L. V. Thom, of this place, J. Buchanan, of Dundalk, and J. A. Matheson, of Pricerville. The committee held their first meeting in the manse here on Monday afternoon last. The Presbytery also agreed to instruct sessions to observe with the church throughout the Dominion the special commemoration of the Lord's death on the first Sabbath in January.
Mr. George Trueman moved from the village last week to Mrs. Charles LeGard's unoccupied house on the east back line.

The minutes of the last session of council were read and confirmed.

Eaton—Ward—That the Reeve be authorized to have Mrs. Blakey examined by a doctor and if she is a fit subject for the asylum to have her removed to the same.—Carried.
Bylaw No. 45 appointing Wm. Dring, J. W. Kenty, Simon Robinson, Thos. Abercrombie, Peter Harris, J. J. Cook, Chas. Fothergill, Jas. Struthers and Samuel Grier deputy returning officers was then passed.
