Editor STANDARD—Your ideas as expressed in last week's STANDARD in reference to County Councils is in harmony with the mind of the masses. It is most natural and reasonable that each and every municipality be directly represented at the County Council, and the reeve of the municipality is by virtue of his position the proper person to fill the office;

moreover, the training which a reeve usually gets, first as member of a municipal council and then as presiding officer of that council, as they usually begin at the bottom and get promotion after faithful service, I say the training thus experienced and knowledge gained of municipal law and usages fits him for the more intelligently and efficiently performing the duties of County Councillor. It is to be hoped that sooner or later the system will be so changed so that the reeves of the municipalities will be our county representatives.—A Ratepayer.
