

Kimberley Siege.

The history of Kimberley siege has been sc often told that we expect all know ee much about it as we do ourselves. Still, some account of what we did and how we lived may be of interest to our tellow-workers.

During the siege we did not hold a single meeting. This may be accounted for by the general unrest and uncertainty. We never knew what a day might being forth, and we thought, it best to give up our regular meetings for the tiese being. Had we known the siege was going to last as long as it did we should have attempted more. But the Beers did not give us any information on that point. Our relief column master pected every week, but, as! we were only doomed to the "hone deferred". wisch "maketh the heart sick."

and among man; other provisions there was one that orgared all lights to be out out at 9.30 gran. This curtailed a great deal of work that might be done during the evenings. The bombardment was a disturbing element. Many times the shells, we a falling in various parts of Kimberles all day long. Of course there were satervals of peace that e ere greatly appreciated, but as the Boers never sent us word when they were going to cease firing it was rather tisky to make arrangements for a meetizg. When concerts were arranged in aid of the "widows and orphans"and other charmable objects, the proviso was usundy inserted. Boers pennitting." Our friends will therefore understand that our inability to hold meetings was not due to any decrease in enthusiasm. Rewever, the members in their individual capacity, Aid a considerable amount of work during that trying period.

Our Flower Mission continued it eark during the whole time. Weel by week we sent bruches to the sick and wounded, with an appropriate tex attasticd. Flowers are glways welcomed and appreciated, and we have reasons to know that many a weary sufferer was cheered and comforted by these silent messengers of peace. We are earning the great possibilities that lie hidden in the Flower Missions. They give" an introduction to the home, afford opportunities for conversation upon our work, and often lead to results that may be lifelong in the impression made upon character.

Side by side with our work of moral sussion we had that of stern military authority in the effort to repress the tyrant drink. It is interesting to ompare the effects of the two processes. In immediate and visible results martial law stands first. Its imperative "Thou shalt not" arrested for a time the drinking customs of society. The penalties attached to the violation of its command were such as make men pause. It did not deal a death blow, but it certainly muzzled the giant drink for the time being. Total prohibition was proclaimed to natives, while to Europeans the hotels and canteens were only during certain hours of the day. It is instructive to note that when good order is imperative even the military authorities find it necessary to act on our principles. But, alas! the reform was short-lived., The law did not effect the appetites of men; when the proclamation was repealed, or partially repealed, menreturned to their old drinking habits.

"How to keep the pot boiling' became a serious problem to every house-wife. Food supplies ran short, and horse-flesh, at the best is not a dainty dish. It is surprising what can be dispensed with when stern necessity drives. We were taught the value of "plain living" if not of "high thinking." The culinary department was placed under a severe strain, and ingenuity was taxed to the utmost to provide three meals a day. New dishes were invented, often with most delightful results; weeds were pressed into service as vegetables, while many were taught lessons in economy that they will never forget. Those who had been accustomed to careful management were those who fared best in those dreary days when we lived on

"rations." Aprildst all the disquiet and suffering there were many bright deeds of quiet horoism and self-sacrifice. When the true history of Kimberley siege is written the names of many women will receive "honorable mention," for they are not the only heroes in the fight who shed their blood on the battle-field or stand in the gate of the city. Strenuous efforts were made to cope with the suffering that existed in the town, and the spirit of helpful service, active sympathy and cheerful courage was very manifest during the whole siege. To make any attempt at counting our blessings would be fruitless. They were more than the hairs of our head or the stars of the heavens. All our members were preserved. Shells fell thick and fast in all parts of the town. It is estimated by those who are able to Laxative Bromo-Quinine Tablets cure

during the siege. There exe few houses that at some time or other were not in the line of fire. There were only about twelve cases of death from the shells. This is remarkable considering our exposure to danger. There was doubtless much sickness and many cases of death, especially among the infants, as a result of improverished living, and yet when we think of a population of 50,000 saved from starvation how great is our mercy and how great our thankfulness should be.

It was a unique experience to live formmonths and not receive a single letter from the outside world, and yet this had its compensation in Laving no etters to answer. Those who are accustomed to a heavy correspondence amidst a crowd of other duties, will often eigh for such relief. And yet the feeling of isolation was fer from pleasant. Anxious thoughts for the welfare of loved ones in the distance often disturbed us. But when the dark night of our loneliness was past Then again martial law prevailed, and the postman again knocked at the door we had our reward. What e day of excitement it was when the Airst mail wrs delivered! How eagerly we opened the letters and with full hearts thanked our Heavenly Father that our friends were all "safe and sound."

The dispersion was most effectually accomplished when the Boers brought 'Long Tom" to bear upon us. Those 00-pound shells carried dismay and shelter from their destructive power. Our members were driven, like the patriarchs of old, to the "dens and caves of the earth." Some went down into the mines and for five days endured a most trying and singular existence. Others went into the redoubts, and some went into railway embankments and had a taste of laager life. Others again sought shelter in tunnels made in the hugh debris heaps that surround Kimberley. It was a strange experience and affords a magnificent retrospect to one's life. But once in a life-time is sufficient. trust that never again will it fall to our lot to endure another siege.

As soon as the siege was raised commenced our ordinary meetings and our work in all its branches is in full swing. We have started work for the ldiers in providing underclothing, literature, etc. We hope in this way to minister to the comfort of the brave men who are enduring such hardships in the field. Our membership is increasing and our influence is spreading. The need is great, and we endeavor to face it in the spirit of the "Battle Song":

'We are coming to the rescue; we are coming in our youth; The homes we build to morrow shall be guarded by the truth; We are coming, to the battle for

country, God and right; And for a winsome token we wear the ribbon white."

The Coming Census.

The next Dominion census will be taken dating from Sunday March 31. This is also the day fixed for taking the census in Great Britain and Treland. All persons who are living at midnight on Sunday will be counted. The census will be taken by name and according to the dejure system. The country will be divided into census districts, consisting as far as possible of electoral districts. The poling sub-divisions agreeing to the boundaries adopted for the recent general election are taking as units of enumeration. There will be one commissioner for each electorial district. and one additional commissioner where local circumstances require his services. There will also be one enumerator for each polling sub-division where the population is sparce. The work of enumeration will begin on Monday, April 1st, and in a great majority of polling sub-divisions it is expected that the work will be through in a fortnight. Provision is also made for the appoinment of four chief officers for the provinces and the Northwest Territories. It will be the duty of these officers to instruct the commissioners concerning the work of the census, and the commissioners in turn will instruct the enumerators. There are twelve schedules against

Raising Poultry.

In the address of Mr. J. E. Meyer, Kossyth, at the recent meeting of the Farmers Institute held here, a great deal of information was given regarding the successful raising of poultry. His subject was "How to build a Poultry House and how to i keep the Roultry Healthy and free from Vermin, and How to Make the most Money out of Poultry, including preparations for the British Market."

Mr. Meyer stated that a poultry house ought to be warm and so placed that the poultry can have a run in the barn-yard and orchard when required, The site should be dry, the buildings low-four feet at the eaves would do. Five or six inches of gravel male a good floor, but cement was better. From 1 to 1 of the south side should 101 be glass. Too much glass would give the extremes of heat and cold. Double windows; were best as the dead air space moderated the temperature. Double felt paper under the shingles was good. Hens should have about six square feet of floor space to each bird, or a building 15x20 for fifty heas. There should be a platform under the perches thirty inches from the floor, and the perches eight inches above the platform. This would make it easy to



At noon feed clover hay, cut and stehmed, with mangolds, cabbage, etc. At night give all the grain they will eat, corn is best in cold weather. It is very necessary to feed green cut bone.
