Interesting Items About Our Own Country, Great Britain, the United States, and All Parts of the Globe, Condensed and Assorted for Easy Reading.

### CANADA.

A manual training school for teachers is to be opened at Ottawa. Paris, Ont., ratepayers have voted in favour of a civic electric light plant. London is seeking the removal of the Terminal Steam Fire Engine Works at Brussels. Miss Darling, a clerk in Aird's company, Montreal, lost her eye by the explosion of a ginger ale bottle. A number of engines for the Intercolonial railway will be completed at the Kingston locomotive works.

The Crown Lands Department of New Brunswick has sold by auction 1,000,000 acres of timber lands on the Nepisiguit River.

The Montreal Cotton Company will build its present capital of \$2,000,000 in \$500,000 to build a new mill at Valleyfield.

A Vancouver despatch says Civil Engineer Poyrette of Ottawa killed Mr. Rowland of Toronto on Saturday in a quarrel originating over a railway.

The Government will invite the use of Commons to vote a sum of money for a national memorial to the Queen Victoria.

John M. Crane, a miner, was shot a narrow gauge, Manitoba, by William Brown in a bar-room quarrel. M. Crane was taken to Winnipeg for treatment and died in the hospital.

At the annual meeting of the Dominion Coal Company it was decided to remove the company's head office from Guelph to Montreal.

Another dividend of four or five cents will soon be declared in the stock of the old Kingston Locomotive Works Company.

Mr. Mackenzie and Messrs. Ross and Holt, of Montreal, according to a despatch, will erect a theatre there at a cost of \$100,000.

There is some talk at Hamilton of a strike among the pork packers, competition having become so keen and the supply of pork so limited that the various pork establishments are not running at more than their capacity.

### GREAT BRITAIN.

Francis Knollys has been appointed private secretary to King Edward VII.

Robert's title is gazetted as Earl of Strathmore and Earl of Kent and Peebles.

English tea merchants are taking quantities of tea out of Britain in violation of increased taxation, and Nelson is the only member of a house of Lords who has been a member of the Victorian era.

Five thousand waiters in London are out of work owing to mourning and the postponement of social functions.

Special status under the seal of Great Britain will be issued, giving Queen Alexandra, the wife of the King, the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

It is said to have sent wire-grams to St. Catharines, Ontario, and The Lizard, 200 miles apart, perfect communication between the two points has been established.

Chapman Brown, a London banker, testified that the average consumption of beer at Liverpool is 300 pounds of arsenic, which is taken on a stretch of land in a million people if administered in equal doses and one at a time.

### UNITED STATES.

A strike of the 4,000 silk workers in Union, Pa., has resulted in a loss of \$15,000,000.

Physicians have decided mosquitoes spread yellow fever and that quarantines are useless.

Theft of a newspaper from the office of a neighbour has cost B. J. West of New Bedford, Mass., \$100.

Carnegie deal contemplates an action which will control the printing trade of the great West.

Set of seven ships' overdue at Astoria, Ore., have been given up as lost. 230 lives and property valued at \$2,000,000.

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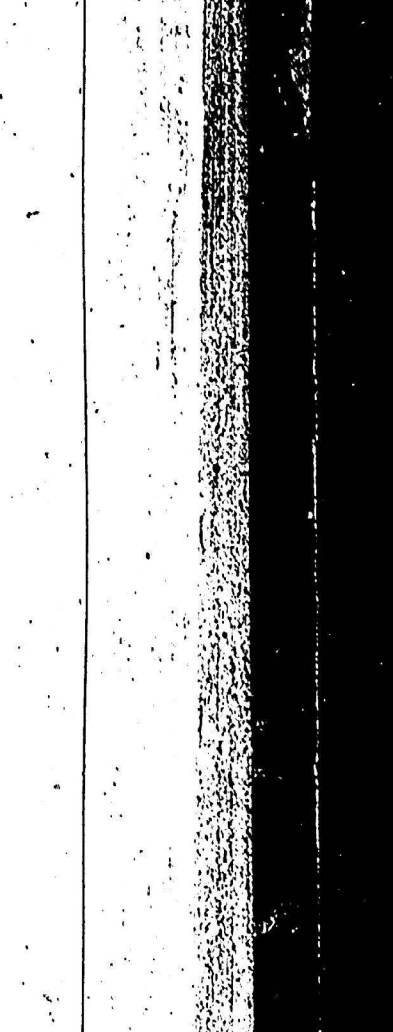
