 Miller—Patton—That by-laws No. 42

 a by-law be passed at the next meeting  
 imposing a rate of 3 per cent and that  
 the interest be refunded to all those  
 who have already paid it.—Lost.  
 Richardson—Tringle—That by-law  
 No. 42 and 43 be amended by striking  
 out the words "2 per cent per month"  
 and inserting therefor 4 per cent on all  
 uncollected taxes after this date. The

**State Aid for Beet Sugar Industry**  
 ONTARIO HOUSE.  
 When the House met Thursday Hon.  
 Mr. Dryden introduced the bill for the  
 encouragement of the sugar beet in-  
 dustry, providing for the setting apart  
 annually \$75,000 for three years. Out  
 of this fund a bounty will be paid to  
 manufacturers of first class sugar made  
 from beets of one-half cent a pound  
 the first year, and one-quarter cent  
 per pound for the products for each of  
 the following years, and no longer.  
 Should the amount claimed as bounty  
 exceed \$75,000 the distribution thereof  
 shall be pro rata, according to the  
 amount of production.  
 Provision is made that during the  
 first year of the operations of such  
 factories the beets shall be paid for at  
 the rate of at least \$4 per ton at the factory  
 and for the two following years at \$4  
 and such additional price at the same  
 rate as shall correspond to the pro-  
 portion of saccharine which such beets  
 contain in excess of 12 per cent. In  
 the event of a dispute as to the quantity  
 of saccharine matter reference shall be  
 made to the analyst of the Ontario  
 Agricultural College, or to such person  
 as may be nominated by the Lienten-  
 ant-Governor-in-Council, whose report  
 shall be final.

**DOMINION HOUSE.**  
 On Monday Dr. Sproule moved a re-  
 solution declaring that in the opinion  
 of the House it was advisable to  
 encourage the establishment of beet  
 root sugar factories by the granting of  
 a bounty on beet root sugar, manufac-  
 tured in the Dominion. He pointed out  
 that last year Canada imported 312,000,000  
 pounds of sugar for home consumption  
 representing a value of \$8,361,000. He  
 affirmed that this sugar could just as  
 well be produced by the people of  
 Canada. Such a quantity would rep-  
 resent the product of about thirty  
 factories. Experience has shown that  
 beets could be properly grown by the  
 farmers of this country, as the climatic  
 conditions and soil are most favorable.  
 Indeed, it had been demonstrated that  
 beets could be grown in Ontario  
 equally as well as in any other country  
 in the world. Last year the province  
 raised 3,000 tons of beets, the greater  
 portion of which was exported to  
 Marine City, Mich., and yielded the  
 farmers, who grew them, a lucrative  
 return. In order to put the beet sugar  
 industry upon a firm basis at the out-  
 set a bounty was desirable. It would  
 cost half a million dollars to erect  
 and equip a factory and about 360  
 hands would be employed at each, so  
 that with thirty factories in existence  
 it would mean 6,000 people directly  
 employed. A bounty for five years  
 would be as long as was necessary to  
 establish the industry thoroughly.  
 Such a bounty had been given in  
 California and Michigan, but after a  
 few years it was found that it was no  
 longer required. He trusted that the  
 Government would consider this  
 question carefully, and give the assist-  
 ance in the interest of the farmers of  
 Canada. (Hear, hear.)  
 Mr. Charlton sympathized with Dr.  
 Sproule's desire to encourage this  
 industry in the Dominion. If he were fully  
 satisfied that a bounty was essential he  
 would support it, but after hearing the  
 arguments of Mr. Sproule he had come  
 to the conclusion that it required only  
 a little energy and enterprise on the  
 part of capitalists to go ahead without  
 a bounty. In two of the States in the  
 American Union factories were running  
 profitably without Government aid,  
 there were forty factories altogether  
 in operation in the United States.  
 Mr. Harris, of Maskinonge, spoke at  
 some length in French. He favored  
 granting the bounty.  
 Mr. Fielding said it was hardly to be  
 expected that the Government would  
 announce their decision on the subject  
 this early. He promised to send with  
 it in his budget address, which would  
 be delivered at an early date. In the  
 meantime he moved that the debate be  
 adjourned.  
 Mr. Clarke Wallace objected strenu-  
 ously to the debate being adjourned.  
 He pointed out that Dr. Sproule had  
 brought forward this subject on two  
 previous sessions, and it was full time  
 for the Government to have made up  
 its mind.  
 The motion to adjourn the debate  
 was then put. The division resulted  
 in a majority of nine for the Govern-  
 ment, the vote standing 59 to 50.
